

Student Workshop: Manage Those Citations With Zotero

On February 20, 2012, Margaret Driscoll gave a Student Workshop about Zotero, the free open-source citation management tool. This was the first Student Workshop this semester and the fourth one in our chapter's Student Workshop series which started at the beginning of last semester. Margaret is a student member of the SJSU ASIS&T Student Chapter. She is finishing up her last semester in the program and planning to graduate in May. She has worked in academic libraries since 1992 with interests in copyright/fair use, open access publishing, digitization, distance learning, and technology. She currently works as the Course Reserves Coordinator at CSU Channel Islands. Some students may also know her as a LIBR 203 Peer Mentor this semester.

Margaret started off her workshop with a short slide presentation providing an overview of Zotero and how it helps to manage the large volume of information that you will often want to keep track of as you engage in research for an academic paper. Zotero is easy to download and comes in a stand-alone version that works with Safari and Chrome and a plug-in version that works with Firefox. Unfortunately, there isn't a version that currently works with Internet Explorer, but Margaret mentioned that the Zotero community is working on this and that one should be available in the future. In addition to the software that works with the particular browser you are using, Zotero also offers an add-in for the Microsoft Word and Open Office word processing programs to offer a convenient way to insert in-text citations and generate a reference list from the citations used in your paper based on information saved within the main Zotero citation management tool. Other aspects of Zotero which Margaret mentioned are the ability to install and run the stand-alone version on a flash drive so that it is portable from one computer to another, and the ability to save your citation information to the Zotero web server so that you can sync and access that information from different computers you may use while working on your research project.

After the introductory slide presentation, Margaret spent a

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good deal of time doing a live demonstration of Zotero as she had it installed in the Firefox browser on her computer. She gave an overview of how to start it up within the browser and the main sections of the tool for organizing your citations into folders, viewing the list of all your saved citations, and the extensive metadata – such as title, author, publication info, abstract, and many other fields – that can be captured for every citation. You can manually edit this metadata and add missing metadata, including a customized notes field for capturing your own notes pertaining to the citation. Margaret demonstrated several of the many different types of resources that can be captured into Zotero, including full-text articles in commercial databases, online electronic journals, and websites. The caveat for some resources is that Zotero can only capture metadata that is actually provided by the online resource, so if there is none available, you will have to manually create it. However, once entered, you can use it with the Word and Open Office add-ins to insert and manage citations in your research paper. In response to a question during the Q&A session, Margaret also mentioned that Zotero will even work with some OPACs if their metadata is visible to the tool.

The workshop was very informative, with many participants offering positive feedback about how they were going to start using the tool on their next research paper. Given Zotero's ease of use and Margaret's excellent overview and demonstration of the tool, any interested student should be able to install and be up and running with the tool within minutes. Academic & Professional Experience Sharing: Gaining Stories, Dreams, and Inspiration at the Library 2.011 Conference

The February 8, 2012 SJSU ASIS&T business meeting's Academic & Professional Experience Sharing feature was presented by Mardi Veiluva.

Mardi, an SJSU ASIS&T member who is currently completing her final semester, shared her experience as a volunteer at the Library 2.011 conference last year in an enthusiastic and inspiring presentation *Library 2.011 & Academic Libraries*. The content of this presentation was threefold: Mardi discussed what makes 2.0 conferences unique, what is involved in being a session volunteer, and what she personally learned from listening in on many of the presentations.

Sponsored by our very own SJSU SLIS program, 2.0 conferences are free, virtual conferences where library and information professionals from around the world gather together in order to share their professional experiences. These annual conferences run continuously over a two day period and offer as many as six concurrent Collaborate sessions at a time over various time-zones. As Mardi explained, the success of the conference rests in session volunteers whose job is to "monitor sessions," or, more specifically, load slides and answer any technical questions the presenters may have - skills she acquired in her LIBR 298 Special Projects class as an Illuminate Trainer. Mardi explained that experience is not necessary to become a volunteer as training is provided.

Mardi shared her experience as an attendee,

which she likened to "listening to people's stories" and provided details from two sessions she found particularly interesting as they dealt with the subject of gaming - a subject of personal interest to her in regards to its use and value in academic libraries. Specifically, Mardi shared snippets of a presentation given by Judith Whey on the upcoming game *Pottermore*, which is based on the J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter* series. The second presentation discussed was given by Mary Broussard and Mardi shared many resources ranging from websites discussing how to create games to Broussard's [blog](#) which discusses a number of games that she uses to test information literacy skills in the library.

With preparations for the 2.012 conference scheduled for October 3 – 5, 2012, Mardi's presentation was very timely and I feel certain that her enthusiastic recounting of her experience as a volunteer convinced many in attendance (myself included) that volunteering at this event is an experience worth pursuing. According to Mardi, volunteering even one hour is welcomed. She pointed out that many ended up volunteering for more hours after their shift because the experience "was kind of addicting." As for Mardi, she was given the title of "super-volunteer" because she volunteered for a 12 hour shift!

Student Workshop: Alternative Careers with the MLIS

On November 28, 2011, Toni Rodriguez presented ["Alternative Careers with the MLIS"](#) as part of the Student Chapter's ongoing Student Workshop series to share the knowledge and experiences of its members. This workshop was part of a larger presentation she participated in while a Peer Mentor during the Fall semester. Even before her studies at SLIS, she was interested in pursuing a career in special libraries and alternative environments that can benefit from the theories and hands-on skills that come with an MLIS from SJSU.

Toni started the workshop by describing alternative library environments and the qualities that make them different from traditional libraries, such as K-12, academic, and public. She highlighted some of the "non-librarian" job titles now being advertised in job listings: Information Specialist, Information Management Specialist, Records Manager, Business Intelligence Analyst, and Market Research Specialist, to name a few.

Toni shared the courses she took to help her hone in on specific areas that interested her and would be valuable skills in the marketplace. She also discussed the courses

that focused on specific types of librarianship—Maps and GIS, Medical, Legal, Music, and Business. She suggested seminar courses that would be beneficial to students looking outside the traditional library career track. Courses such as Social Media for Business Research (LIBR 282), and Social Media and Special Collections (LIBR 284) are two recent additions to the course offerings. She also took Web 2.0 Tools for Libraries (LIBR 246) because libraries and non-libraries are now discovering the possibilities of social media and examining which tools will engage patrons and/or customers.

Although it would be ideal to work in a library post-SLIS, it may not be possible in this economic climate, and it is important to remain flexible during the job search process. LIS skill-sets are valuable in any sector, public or private.
